I am deeply grateful to them, and to Opus Dei, and all it stands for.

That's the Opus Dei my friends and I live here in Cork. It's the only Opus Dei. The other so-called 'secretive, mysterious organization' is a creation of some people's imagination. Certainly, like all other loyal Catholics, I stand up for truth and integrity, for high moral standards and for Church teaching, to the best of my ability. Apart from that, the only agenda Opus Dei has is hard work, prayer, the grace of God and good humour. If media and other people would accept these simple truths, I think they'd find Opus Dei a simple straightforward organization and a very attractive one at that.

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
