Biographical Notes....

Isidoro was very much a man of our time. He was born at the turn of the century in Buenos Aires and at a very early age moved with his family from Argentina to Spain.

After High School graduation, Isidoro entered the Engineering School in Madrid. He was a good student; he did his work well and earned good marks. After receiving his Engineering degree he went to work for the Andalusian Railroad Company. He loved his work as an engineer; he was praised by the executives of the company, respected by his colleagues, very much appreciated by those who worked under him. Isidoro was successful.

In 1930 Isidoro joined Opus Dei. In doing so he did not in any way stop being an engineer; on the contrary, he became a better engineer. There was a new meaning in his hours of work at the drawing board, in his slide rule calculations, in his young executive job. His life was now Opus Dei, Work of God. Isidoro was now God's Engineer.

One can hardly find any extraordinary events in his short life. The extraordinary thing about him is that he sought perfection in his everyday work and in the small details of his daily job.

We picture the Servant of God as he was: dressed as the engineer next to him, handling a slide rule, perfectly secular. And, at the same time, in him and around him, we find the light and warmth of one who is completely dedicated to God. With his colorful tie and the happiness of his dedicated life Isidoro is a challenge to any of us.

MADRID, July 15, 1943

July 1943. Isidoro is in the hospital. His sickness has followed its normal course. Each time the choking and coughing spells are more frequent. But he continues with the same interior peace, with the same serenity, even in the midst of his extreme state of fatigue. And with this peace there is a heroic humility concealing with ingenuity and joy his physical pain.

The end is approaching very rapidly. Isidoro does not sleep day or night. It is necessary to give him injections to revive the heart. Isidoro cannot recite the Rosary except mentally. He just barely breathes, even with great effort, and his strength is totally exhausted.

July 15. Isidoro does very little speaking. It is blazing hot outside in the streets of Madrid, and the awnings on the windows of the hospital cannot keep his room cool. He needs water, but when he wishes for it, all he can do is to move a finger. He cannot use his lips. He lays all morning inert on his bed, his pajamas in disarray, his body reeking with sweat. One of the members of Opus Dei is always at his side. Once in the morning does Isidoro say something. "How are you?" the nurse asks him. "Very well," he answers.

Noon. Clocks strike twelve outside in the city. The Opus Dei member who sits beside Isidoro stands up. He looks at the image of Our Lady that is on the bedside table and recites

the angelus aloud. Isidoro can only listen..."The angel of the Lord declared unto Mary...."

A sister arrives with some food. He seems not to see it, but when she urges him to open his mouth and swallow, he opens his mouth obediently, and takes something. But the effort is too much for him. He sinks into a sleep of exhaustion.

4:30 p.m. Isidoro's visitor tiptoes from the room. He cannot stay any longer, for he has an appointment to keep and someone else should have replaced him by now. He has not arrived yet; he will surely come in a few minutes. For the first time since Isidoro has been in a hospital is he alone.

Today will end the long agony. Many times has Isidoro tasted the phrase of the Scripture: "I rejoice in what has been told me: we will go to the house of the Lord—Laetatus sum in his quae dicta sunt mihi: in domum Domini ibimus."

Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory be to the Father.

In conformity with the decrees of Pope Urban VIII, we declare that this prayer is not intended for public devotion and that in interpreting the favors received through his intercession and the sanctity of the Servant of God, in no way is it intended that the judgment of the Holy Church be anticipated.

But I can't help pitying those Christians—pious people, 'apostles!', many of them —who smile when they hear extraordinary ways, supernatural events spoken of. A LIFE of FAITH

"The just man lives by faith", writes Saint Paul in the Epistle to the Romans. The life of dedication and sacrifice that Isidoro lived was a life of faith carried to its furthest consequences. To many of us everyday work becomes monotonous, daily struggle is tiring, the often repeated jobs bore us and the usual has no color. This happens only because we lack love. Monotony did not exist for Isidoro because he believed and he loved. "There is nothing to do", writes Isi-

"How humbly and simply do the Evangelists relate incidents that show up the weak and wavering faith of the Apostles!

This is so that you and I will not lose the hope of achieving some day the strong and unshakeable faith that those first few Apostles afterwards had."

doro, "but to fulfill God's will by perseverance in our prayers, our labors, our mortifications, our voluntary sacrifices, doing what we do steadily, without head-long haste, in the consciousness that God will give us always what is best for us, though it may be or seem to be contrary to our desires."

Pain, suffering, solitude... these things which are the salt of life, had only one meaning for Isidoro; the meaning that faith gave them, that he was "on the way". "I beg the Lord to give us perseverance", he wrote in a letter on April 4th, 1937. "I understand why the disciples kept asking Our Lord for faith, more faith. It is the shield with which we protect ourselves in our discouragements and failures."

Isidoro's faith was dynamic, a faith that gave light and warmth. It was something natural—supernaturally natural to the life he lead as a man of God, a servant of the Lord.

"Stir up your fire of faith." The Founder of Opus Dei has written "Christ is not a figure of the past. He is not a memory that is lost in history." (The Way, 584) Isidoro stirred up his faith by reading the Gospel. When he was already seriously ill, he would have others read it to him, telling them the exact passage where he had left off the day before. A friend of his tells us that he was with Isidoro one day when Holy Communion was brought to him: "Very early in the morning the Father came to bring him Communion. A while before he arrived Isidoro said to me: 'Let's wait for Our Lord by reading the Gospels."

"If you have faith like a mustard seed!"... What promises are contained in this exclamation of the Master!

In Isidoro's room there was something supernatural that made a great impression on those who came to see him. "In that room, you lived Isidoro's presence of God" remarked someone after a visit to the hospital.

On May 9, 1950 a plaque in memory of Isidoro was unveiled in the Malaga Technical School, where he taught for seven years. Bishop Herrera of Malaga, the Director and Faculty of the School, the Consul of Argentina, many engineers and people who knew Isidoro were present.

The plaque unveiled by the Director of the School reads: "The Servant of God Isidoro Zorzano, Industrial Engineer, with a spirit of Christian charity served the Malaga Technical School during the years 1929 to 1936 with his knowledge, his mind and his will.

The ceremony was closed with a talk by Bishop Herrera.
