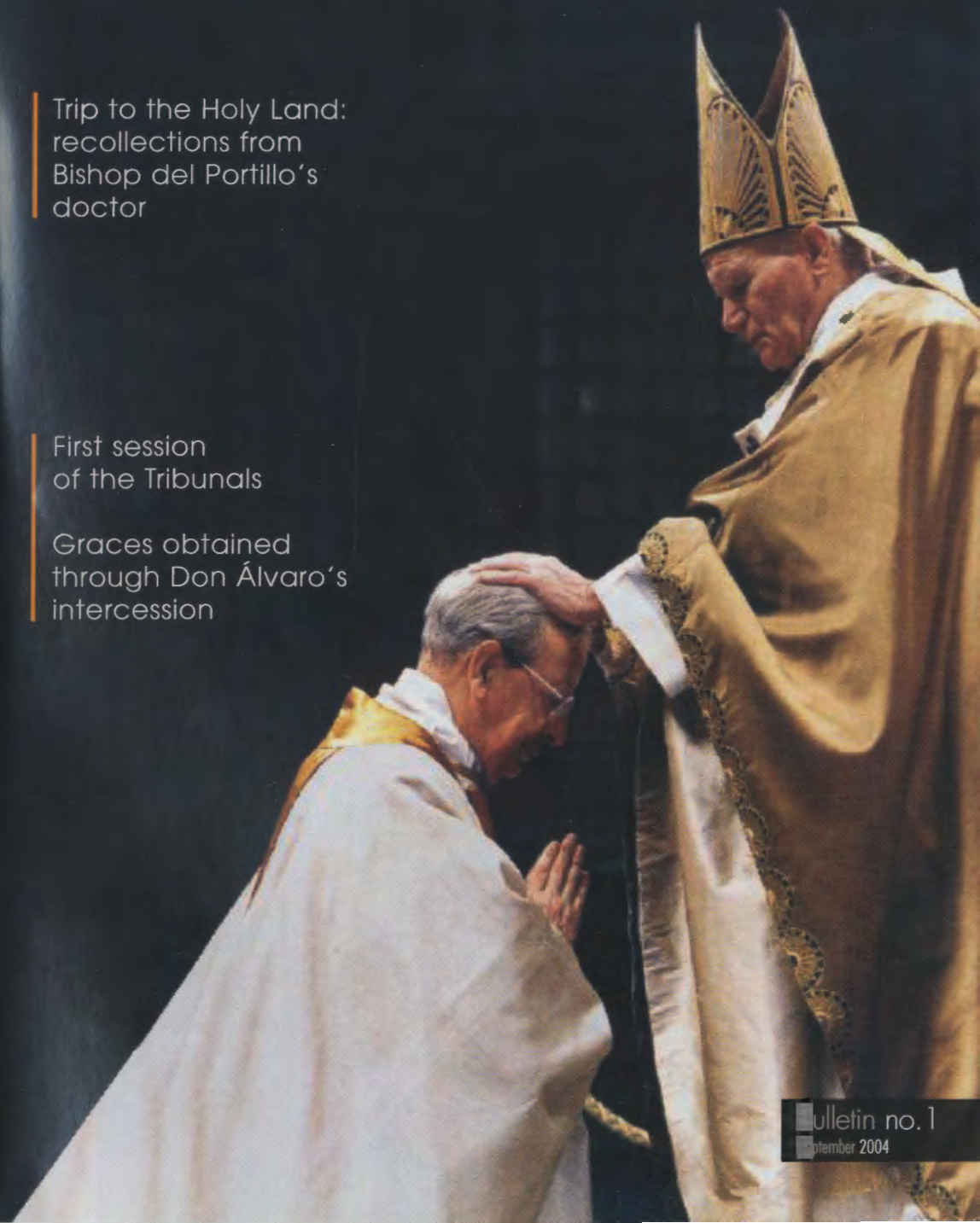

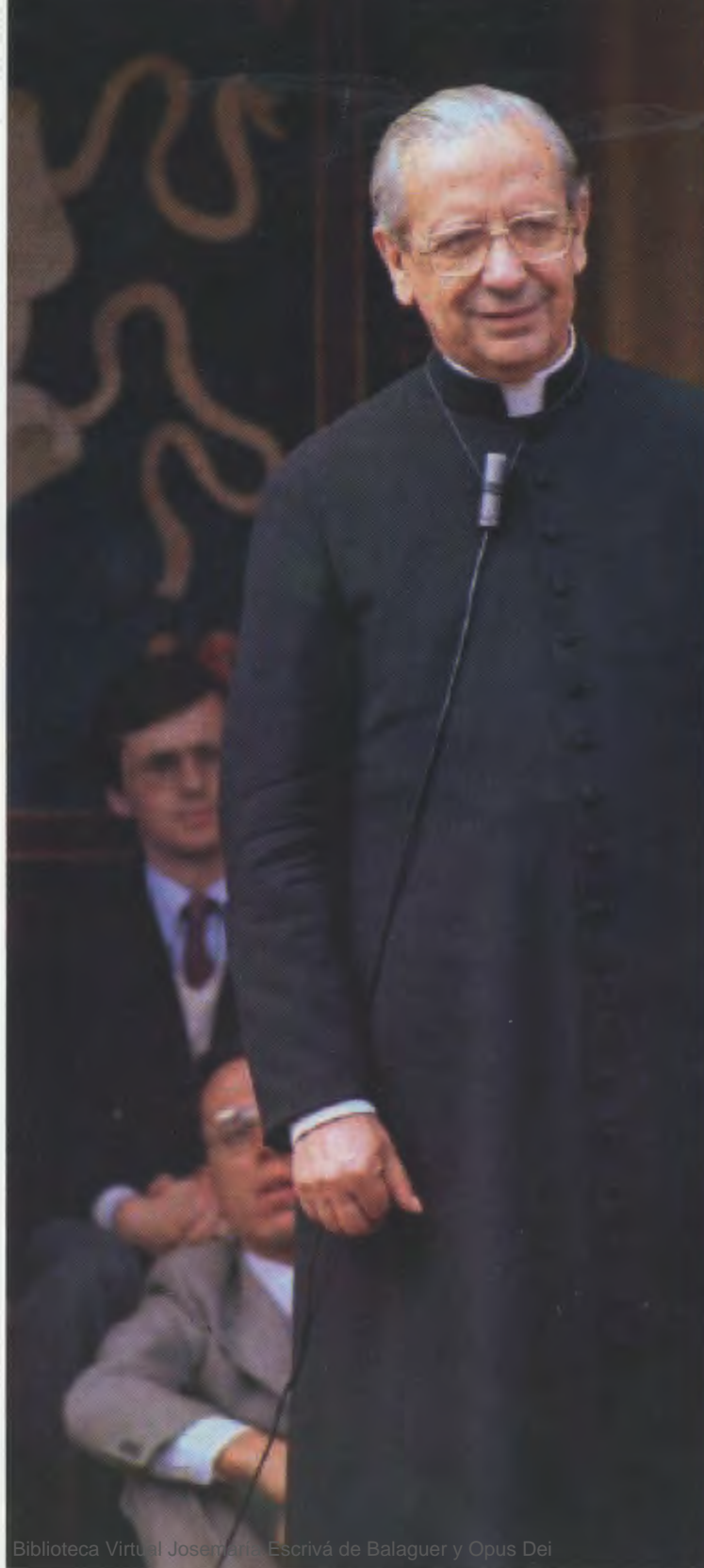
Álvaro del Portillo

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Bishop Álvaro del Portillo was born in Madrid, Spain, on March 11, 1914. He was a civil engineer and also held doctorates in philosophy and canon law. On June 25, 1944, he was ordained a priest. Two years later, he moved to Rome, where he worked directly with St. Josemaría Escrivá, the founder of Opus Dei. His service to the Church was also shown in his dedicated work in tasks entrusted to him by the Holy See and especially in his active participation in the work of the Second Vatican Council. In 1975, after the death of St. Josemaría, he was elected to succeed him as head of Opus Dei. On January 6, 1991, Pope John Paul II ordained him as bishop. The Servant of God's pastoral work was characterized by fidelity to the spirit of Opus Dei's founder and by zeal in extending the apostolates of the Prelature and the call to holiness in ordinary life throughout the world. On the morning of March 23, 1994, a few hours after returning from a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, our Lord called to himself this good and faithful servant of his. That same day, the Holy Father John Paul II went to pray before his mortal remains, which now repose in the crypt of the Prelatic Church of Our Lady of Peace, in Rome.

THE CAUSE OF CANONIZATION: FIRST SESSION OF THE TRIBUNALS

Opening ceremonies of the tribunals; Cardinal Ruini's address;
words from the Prelate of Opus Dei

The Congregation for the Causes of the Saints approved two tribunals of equal competence for the diocesan investigation of the life, virtues and reputation for sanctity of Bishop Álvaro del Portillo: one from the Vicariate of Rome and the other from the Prelature of Opus Dei.

The opening session of the Vicariate of Rome's tribunal was held on March 5, 2004, in the Lateran Palace's Hall of Conciliation, and

was presided over by Cardinal Camilo Ruini, the Holy Father's vicar for the Diocese of Rome.

In his address, Cardinal Ruini gave a biographical sketch of Bishop del Portillo. "The deep pastoral experience he gained working alongside St. Josemaría, his proven human qualities and his theological and juridical competence enabled him to undertake many different tasks," he said. The

Pope's vicar emphasized "the long and multifaceted activity that he carried out in the service of the Apostolic See" as a consultor for various congregations, as secretary of the Second Vatican Council commission that prepared *Presbyterorum Ordinis*, as a consultor for other Conciliar commissions, and as a synod Father.

"The frequent occasions that I had to meet Bishop del Portillo," recalled Cardinal Ruini, "imprinted on my soul the conviction that I found myself in the presence of an exemplary pastor." He went on: "In his firm adherence to the doctrine of the Church, in his union with the Pope, in his pastoral charity, in his humility, and in his balanced character, he exhibited an extraordinary interior richness."

According to the Cardinal, "the service that Don Álvaro provided to the Church of Rome, and the prompt and effective way he supported the Holy Father's pastoral initiatives in this diocese, showed the love for the Church that he had learned from St. Josemaría."

The swearing in ceremony for the members of the Tribunal and the Postulator of the cause was held in the presence of the Cardinal.

A few days later, on March 20, the opening session of the Tribunal of the Prelature of Opus Dei was held in the Höffner Hall of the Pontifical University of the Holy Cross, in Rome, with four hundred people present.

The Prelate of Opus Dei, Bishop Javier Echevarría, noted that "shortly after his death I received many written testimonies confirming how widespread Don Álvaro's reputation for holiness was even during his lifetime. The writers expressed the wish that his cause of canonization be opened. Among these documents were some 200 letters from bishops (35 of them cardinals) from 25 countries."

Bishop Echevarría recalled that when work began on St. Josemaría's cause of canon-

ization, Don Álvaro "never missed the opportunity to help us understand that the aim was not to seek the human glory of Opus Dei, but the good of the whole Church, the good of souls." The Prelate of Opus Dei expressed his hope that the cause of Bishop del Portillo would also be an opportunity for many souls, "to discover," through Don Álvaro, "the fatherly face of God, who smiles on us, encourages us, and forgives us."

II FAST DAYS IN THE HOLY LAND

Recollections from the doctor who shared in the Servant of God's final earthly journey

Early on the afternoon of March 14, 1994, Don Álvaro, Fr. Javier Echevarría, Fr. Joaquín Alonso and I left the Ciampino airport for Tel Aviv. Don Álvaro was making that trip to the Holy Land because of his great love for Jesus Christ, and also for pastoral reasons. A handful of the Prelature of Opus Dei's faithful had recently begun to work in Jerusalem and carry out their apostolate there. The trip was paid for by one of Don Álvaro's friends as an 80th birthday present.

I can never be thankful enough for the privilege of accompanying Don Álvaro on this trip. He created around him a family atmosphere of human affection and good humor, which made

for an unforgettable experience.

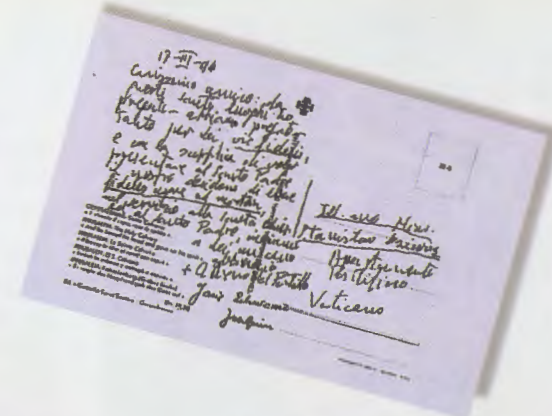
With his eyes fixed on Christ ... and on those around him

The Uruguayan ambassador to Israel, Anibal Diaz, had placed his car at Don Álvaro's disposal. On the 15th we drove from Tel Aviv to Nazareth, passing by Mount Carmel. In Haifa, a Puerto Rican tourist recognized Don Álvaro and asked him to let her husband take a picture of her with him. Don Álvaro agreed. Similar scenes took place in the following days. That evening in Nazareth, Don Álvaro celebrated Holy Mass in the Basilica of the Annunciation. In his homily

he spoke of the mystery of the Incarnation and of suffering as God's gift, undoubtedly thinking of Anibal, who was suffering from a serious illness and who attended the Mass with his wife.

On the morning of the 16th we went to the Church of the Primacy of Peter, and later to the Mount of the Beatitudes, where Don Álvaro celebrated Mass. Afterwards we went to Capernaum. In the afternoon we spent half an hour praying on the shore of the Sea of Galilee. Don Álvaro, Fr. Javier and Fr. Joaquín sat on a fallen tree trunk, and Fr. Joaquín read some Gospel passages recounting times when Jesus was present at that place. I sat on a rock behind Don Álvaro, with Fr. Alberto Steinworth, one of the priests of Opus Dei who lived in Jerusalem. Trying not to distract them, I took some videos

of the scene. Close to the shore we saw a nun and in another place, a monk. As we left, four boys of different races came and began to pray quietly. On the way back we picked a few leaves from some plants as a souvenir.

On the following day, March 17th, we drove from Nazareth to Jerusalem, with a stop at Mount Tabor, where Don Álvaro said Mass. In Jerusalem, after praying at the Holy Sepulcher and at Calvary, Don Álvaro visited the two Opus Dei centers in the city. During the next few days he returned at various times to both centers and said Mass on March 20th in one and on March 21st in the other. On the 18th he celebrated Mass at one of the altars of the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher and on the 19th in the Basilica of the Nativity in Bethlehem. The 19th, Saturday, was

my saint's day, and Don Álvaro congratulated me as soon as he saw me at breakfast. That day there was a gathering in the afternoon at the Paradise Hotel in Bethlehem, with more than a hundred people attending, among them Christians, Jews and Muslims. It was a very cordial get-together. Don Álvaro responded with great affection and tact to the questions he was asked. He insisted on the need for Arabs and Jews to live together peacefully. Later, in Jerusalem, he visited the Latin Patriarch. Two days later he also visited the Apostolic Delegation.

In the Cenacle

On Sunday the 20th we went to Bethany in the morning and to Ain-karin in the afternoon. At 11:00 a.m. on March 22nd, Don Álvaro concelebrated Mass in the Cenacle with Fr. Javier, Fr. Joaquín, Fr. Alberto and Fr. Lawrence Richardson, another priest of Opus Dei living in Jerusalem. This was to be the last Mass of his

pilgrimage to the Holy Land. But it was also, and who could have imagined it, Don Álvaro's final Mass on earth. Fr. Javier preached the homily and Don Álvaro gave us Communion.

A few hours later we were on the plane, returning to Rome. During the flight I trained the video camera on Don Álvaro and began to film him. He smiled for the camera and then gave a wave of greeting, or of farewell, with his hand. Around eight in the evening, the youngest of the crew offered us something to drink. Don Álvaro and Fr. Javier asked him about his family, his work, and his interests, and then told him a bit about the spirit of the Work.

At the Ciampino airport some families were waiting with bouquets of flowers. Don Álvaro was very affectionate with everyone.

During the night

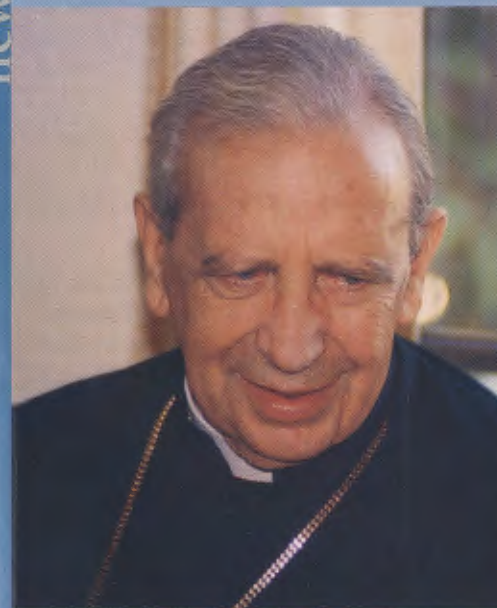
I went to bed shortly after arriving home, and about three in the morning Don Javier called me: Don Álvaro didn't feel well. When I reached his room, he was having difficulty breathing. He immediately lost conscience. I gave him oxygen; he had hardly any pulse. After treatment with medications, cardio-pulmonary resuscitation efforts were initiated, but without success. I had to tell Fr. Javier that Don Álvaro was dying. Don Javier gave him absolution several times and administered the Anointing of the Sick. Around 4:00 in the morning, when Fr. Javier asked whether Don Álvaro had died, I could only answer that he had. I kissed the kind and now lifeless face of Don Álvaro, sure that he was smiling at me from heaven. ▲

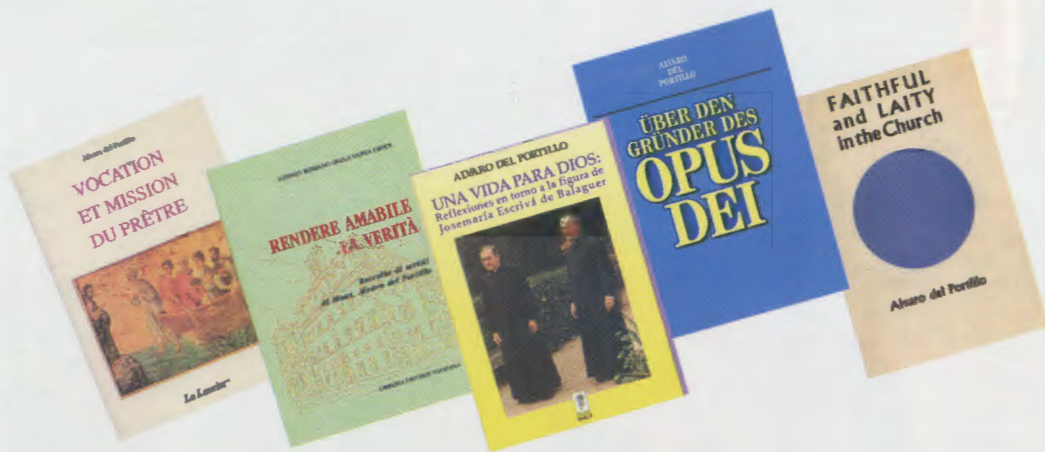
Impossible university bills

Three years of migraine headaches

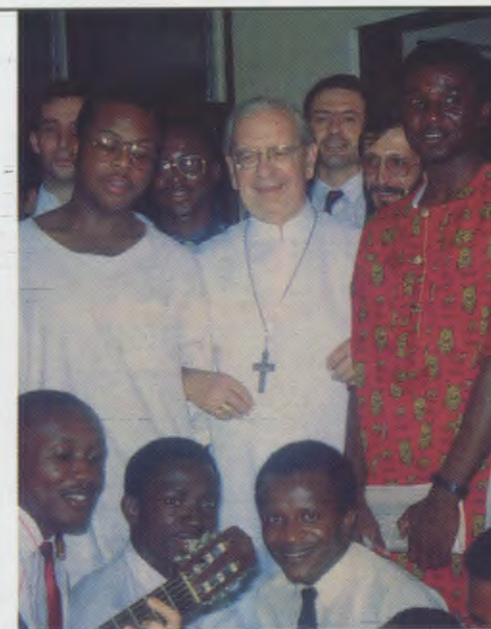
In November 1998, I began to suffer migraine headaches, something I had never had before. During the first year they

occurred four or five times a month. Later they grew worse and increased to around ten times a month. I was forced to give up doing part of my regular work.

In September 2001 the pain became even more frequent. In November I had migraine headaches every other day. Each time I suffered the attacks I took some medicine that alleviated the pain but made me feel very ill. In agreement with the company doctor, it was decided that I should give up my job, because even the two hours I had been working were a great effort for me.

Not knowing what to do, I began a novena to God, using the prayer card of Don Álvaro. During the first two weeks I didn't obtain a cure, but there was a "spiritual cure" of two friends, something that gave me consolation and strength.

On the day after finishing the third novena, December 12, the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, I had my last attack of pain. I attribute this miraculous and rapid cure after three years to the intercession of Don Álvaro del Portillo.

Now that I no longer have the migraine headaches, my life is as it was before. I can work, travel, read, listen to music, etc.
