懷緬已故同窗 - 若望保祿二世

年輕的卡羅爾華迪卡(Karol Wojtyła)早已熱衷祈禱 Chiara Santomiero 撰

羅馬,2011年5月8日(Zenit.org)—「那是1944年8月。當時華沙剛展開了納粹抗戰,沙比亞樞機主教(Cardinal Sapieha)決定收留修生在主教住所。這是我初次遇見卡羅爾華迪卡(Karol Wojtyła)。」Kazimierz Suder主教用他平和的聲線,讀出眼前幾張小紙條上的段段回憶。

記者們則像一群等待考試的學生,安坐於餐枱的另一端。他們專誠來到克拉科夫(Krakow),只為會見由當年克拉科夫不屈不撓的主教兼上任大主教沙比亞(Adamo Sapieha)於德國侵佔波蘭期



間一手創辦的秘密神學院八位學生之中唯一還在世的Kazimierz Suder主教。

Kazimierz Suder主教解釋:「被納粹德軍侵佔期間,只要有人向樞機主教表明自己渴望成為神父的意願,樞機主教就會告知他一切書目,讓他自行回家秘密研習。我們修生彼此從不認識。」

這一切防禦措施都是必需的。當年納粹德軍曾發現五位年輕人聚集在已關 閉的神學院內,為此他們即時逮捕並槍殺五人,更將其他人押送至奧斯威 辛集中營。自此,沙比亞樞機主教就把整個神學院隱藏於地下發展。

聆聽

年老的Kazimierz Suder主教身後掛著前教宗的相片,相中的卡羅爾華迪卡 (Karol Wojtyła)正在托頭沉思。窗外環伺聖瑪利亞大教堂(Mariacka Basilica)的 美景。50年前,若望保祿二世就委身在這裡,履行其精神領袖的職務。

「自當年八月的那一天起,卡羅爾(Karol Wojtyła)的面貌至今仍在我記憶中留下深刻印象。」Kazimierz Suder主教説:「他穿著白色裇衫及厚厚的長褲,雙腳套上木屐。額頭但見明顯疤痕。後來,我才知道他曾被貨車撞傷過。」

「他是很好的同伴。」Kazimierz Suder主教憶述道。「跟他溝通從未出現問題。」華迪卡「向來言簡謙厚,因為他喜歡聆聽。他只就事情表達意見,但從不將之強加於人。他總是努力去了解別人,而且從不説謊。」

年輕的華迪卡(Karol Wojtyła)樂於借出自己的筆記,而筆記的每一頁均寫上

耶穌及瑪利亞的名字縮寫。他亦慶幸自己能夠幫助朋友學習,但並非協助 他們考試。一位同伴曾在測驗時向他問取答案,他只回答説:「專注此 刻,懇求聖神,然後自己尋找答案。」

「他擁有誠懇的目光。」Kazimierz Suder主教續説:「又有幽默感,而且喜愛聽笑話。」

「華沙抗戰失敗後,多位被迫逃難的神父來到主教住所。我們把房間讓給他們,自己則擠進平時用作上課的樞機講道室內睡覺。」

我們大家擠在一起共同生活的日子,讓很多年輕人緊密聚首,直到俄軍於1945年入城為止。「我知道華迪卡(Karol Wojtyła)在瓦多維采(Wadovice)出生,家人過身後,就與父親一同遷往克拉科夫(Krakow)。到父親於1941年去世,他就立志以成為神父為終身目標。」

苦難

年輕的華迪卡(Karol Wojtyła)還有另一特質足教同窗Kazimierz Suder主教畢生難忘:「他對人類的苦難總是相當敏鋭。他把一切所得的都贈予貧民,而且往往非常低調,絕不展現自己的慷慨。」

Kazimierz Suder主教補充説:「除此之外,他亦天生擅於祈禱。」他常常手持玫瑰念珠祈禱,頸項亦總戴著加爾默羅的聖衣。「他不曾把神學研究與祈禱分開。對他來説,兩者已合而為一。晚禱後,前教宗總會帶同神學手冊或筆記留在聖堂內。將學習與祈禱融合為一,是他的獨特之處。

Kazimierz Suder主教亦談及年輕人對沙比亞樞機主教的看法: 他是教人引以為傲的納粹敵人,亦是波蘭抗戰的支柱。他總是伏於地上、伸開雙手祈禱,就如十字架一樣。

Kazimierz Suder主教再次轉向已故同窗的相片,前教宗若望保禄二世的笑臉 現在掛於聖伯多祿大教堂(St. Peter's Basilica)的露台內。Kazimierz Suder 主 教謙遜地承認:「我從未做到如他一般專注地祈禱。」

羅馬之路

1946年11 月1 日,華迪卡(Karol Wojtyła)獲祝聖成為神父。翌日,他在瓦維爾大教堂(Wawel Cathedral)的聖倫納德聖堂(Chapel of St. Leonard)參與首個感恩祭彌撒,到11月10日,他就正式踏上瓦多維采(Wadovice)的祭台。

Kazimierz Suder主教提到:「同一星期,卡羅爾離開羅馬攻讀博士學位。直到當時,他只是在秘密神學院研習了兩年。」

前教宗若望保禄二世精采的一生,為改變其故鄉波蘭的命運作出了莫大貢獻,世界亦由此揭開新的一頁。

護士憶述若望保祿二世的最後一天[,]他如何背 負受苦者的十字架

羅馬,2011年5月8日(Zenit.org)—『他們在近中午時分致電給我,我急忙地趕到聖父的寓所,因為我擔心去到已經太遲,然而,他卻在等待著我。我馬上説:「早安,聖父,今天陽光充沛」,因為我知道他(尤其在醫院時)很喜歡聽我這樣說。』

這就是羅馬杰梅利綜合醫院前康復病房護士主管Rita Megliorin四月二日早上她被召喚到宗座住所時的憶述,當時若望保祿二世正在垂危中。

Megliorin女士星期五(四月二十九日)在羅馬的聖十字架大學給記者述説這些情況。

「我想他不會認得我。他望著我 --- 不像那個他慣常急於知道自己身體狀況的樣子; 他只是親切地望著我,那目光觸動我。」她細述:「我即時把我的頭鑽進他手裏,讓我感受他最後的撫摸,我把他軟弱無力的手按在我面上,而

他那時正注視著病床前,牆上掛著受苦基 督的畫像。」

聽到在聖伯多祿廣場上聚集的青年的歌聲、祈禱聲及歡呼聲越來越變得大聲, Megliorin女士便問教宗的私人秘書斯坦尼斯瓦夫·扎維茲樞機,這些聲音會否打擾 教宗「他卻領我到窗前説:『Rita,這些孩子到這裏來是為了向聖父問好。』』



光明

2005年1月是Megliorin女士首次在杰梅利 綜合醫院與教宗見面。有一天,她如常地

上班,竟想不到教宗身處醫院裏,有人催促她到十樓,因為那裏有一個「非常重要的病人」。

她說與若望保祿二世在一起的時光,「就像在一個沒有時空限制的地方,感覺像在天堂一樣。」

「他在住院期間的數個月,每天早上,當我到他的房間時,他已經醒了,因

為他從早上三點鐘便開始祈禱。我會打開窗簾,對他說:『早安,聖父,今天陽光充沛。』他會轉臉望向我及給我降福。我便跪下,他會摸著我的臉。」這個程序就標誌著聖父每天的開始。「除此之外,我是一個頑固的護士,而他是一個堅持己見的病人。他要得到自己身體狀況的最新信息,尤其是他的病況及其嚴重性。如果他不明白,他會給我一個請求的目光,希望我給他解釋清楚。」

「他從不會停止研究關於人類的課題。我記得那些關於遺傳學的書,縱使他 在病榻中,他仍經常用以參考及研究。」她解釋:「每天他會對我們說,每 個問題都有解決方法。」

「他對弱小者特別關愛,就像每位父親一樣。例如,在羅馬Tor Vergata舉行的普世青年節,他向站在最後排的青年問好,因為他知道他們不可能看得清楚。在醫院時,他總是忙著與不是重要的人物在一起,卻甚少與傑出的教授為伍,他會關心弱小者的家人,也詢問他們是否有孩子在家中。

她簡述:「教宗在綜合醫院裏忍受著可能是最艱苦的時刻,」並補充説:「為那些信天主的人來說,能夠幫助病人是一種恩賜。但為那些不信的人,這也是一個不平凡的經歷。」

今天更美好

當被問及有沒有一套關於華迪卡(教宗)生平的電影可以媲美他垂危時所經驗過的時刻,她反問在場人士有沒有經歷過抱著垂危父/母的時刻。之後,她很不情願地回答:「我不能回應。」接著說:「沒有經歷過是不會明白的。」

另一個記者問死亡是否一個解脱。她答道:「死亡永遠不是一個解脱」「作為一個護士,我只可以説照顧是很有限的,超出這樣便變成英勇了。」

Megliorin的結論是:「在他(望保禄二世)生命最後的時刻,不單只背負自己的十字架,同時他亦背負所有受苦者的十字架。他滿心歡喜地這樣做,懷著希望地相信明天會更好。事實上,我想為他來說,這已是一個更好的今天的希望。」

聖施禮華的著作

路濟亞,一位年輕的母親,前銀行行政人員,為推廣聖施禮華的著作,在香港不同堂區舉辦了書展。

在書展中,有堂區教友要求我們推介一些書籍作靈修閱讀,送給朋友、子女,或新領洗者等,的確,每年有很多慕道者領洗呢! 在書展中,《我願意》往往是甚為暢銷的兒童書,若是幼兒的話,漫畫版的《流水終會穿過山嶺》也甚受歡迎。在某些堂區,《十字苦路》很好賣,而在另一

些堂區,父母手冊《羅盤》銷路也很不俗啊!不過,《道路》一書總是最好賣的,我想這是由於《道路》已售出超過數百萬本,並已被翻譯成三十七多種文字,是名乎其實的暢銷書!我只須提出這些數據,通常教友都會購買的。

除選購書籍外,顧客也有跟我 們分享閱讀心得,有些説他們 沒有時間飽覽家中所藏的靈修 書籍,這不也是我們的遭遇嗎? 怪不得這説法似曾相識,我們



不也遇過這問題嗎?又有些教友提到有些靈修書很沉悶,是的,我也有同感,我也曾遇過這情況,有些靈修書對我們平信徒而言,的確是頗為深奧的,因此,清泉出版社希望出版淺白易明,及容易理解的靈修書籍,供讀者選購。此外,還有一些教友詢問有關聖施禮華及主業會舉辦的靈修講座和避靜事宜,我們當然極為樂意回答呢!

除此以外,在書展義工方面,他們總是充滿熱誠的。他們之中有主業會會員,有主業會協助人,與及他們的朋友,和平信徒等。為了我們的目標,他們熱心幫忙,有的更請纓代清泉出版社向他們自己的本堂神父提出申辦書展之要求,我們對此深表感謝。

在書展過程中,我們變得更加親近。有教友告之,她購買清泉書籍後,於"臉書"網 (facebook)中作分享,不多久,她的朋友會請她代為購買。聽到這消息,我們可樂透了,因為我們明白到,其他人也可藉著他們的朋友接觸到聖施禮華的著作,或是有關主業會的資訊,並於個別堂區之書展完結後,書展之精神也會於其他平台展現。

這正如聖施禮華在《道路》第831節中所説:「你是塊投入湖中的小石子。藉你的表樣和言語,你產生了第一個漣漪…這一個,造成另一個…另一個, 又另一個…一個比一個大。」

我是來自中國北京的王仲華,目前在德國留學。我透過我最好的朋友接觸到天主教信仰。自此,特別是在找到天主教信仰及主業會之後,我的生命徹底改變了。



對住在一個陌生的地方的中國留學生來說,生活有時會是十分困難的。我們 遇到的障礙,遠遠超過其他人,尤其是在語言方面,還加上要面對遠離自己 家人的孤獨。



但在認識聖施禮華 後,我找到了一個解 決的方法。

我非常感激聖施禮華,因為透過向他的祈禱,我得到所需的精神支持。我將於這個星期六領洗,成為一名天主教徒。我非常高興。十分感謝你,聖施禮華。



露芙,一位主業會的已婚會員,在41歲時死於乳癌。最近 Ignatius Press 特別為她出版了 一本由她丈夫所編輯的書。書名為「天主的仁慈是何等的不可思議」。 書中大都是她的信扎和文摘,內容充份展現了她的才華、深厚的信德和喜悦的精神。最後,並且以她給主業會協助人的數篇講義為結尾。

這書的序言是由哲學家彼得基庫所撰寫。 他寫道:「在這書中你會遇見一位真正 了不起的人。生命中,只有甚少的事情會 比她所描述的更為珍貴。我誠邀你去認識 這位生命的鬭士,她的筆桿尤勝死亡的刀 劍。」

作家米高諾域也給與這書高度的讚賞: 「我從未看過一本比它更美麗動人的書, 一本描述怎樣以歡愉的生活來壓倒死亡帶來的憂傷;一本關於悲傷和快樂的書。」

「在喧嚷的孩子們當中綻放著喜樂」

露芙柏嘉禄在1998年因乳癌擴散而英年早逝,享年41歲。她有七名孩子(其中一名夭折於嬰兒猝死綜合症)。她下嫁予邁克柏嘉祿,他是聖母大學哲學系的教授,也是波士頓先鋒報的專欄作家。 Ignatius Press 剛剛出版了一輯她偉大的信集和講義,書名為 「天主的仁慈是何等的不可思議」,此書是由邁克所編輯及撰寫傳記和備註的。

有人或者會認為在她的生命裏,烙印着兒子湯馬斯的早夭,接着是她自己的離世應是悲慘的。其實不然,它是一齣既神聖而又圓滿的喜劇,充份體現出「天主的仁慈是何等的不可思議」 — 是出自格雷厄姆格林的一本小説,她最喜愛的句子之一。

因為,這正是邁克在他的序言中所指出的一樣,露芙的生活是在日常生活的 起落中不斷的轉變和喜樂。她對最微小的事物也表露出極大的愛心。 正如教 宗本篤最近談及聖德蘭 小耶穌一樣。賦於豐富的幽默感、強勁敏鋭的領悟力、和具有震撼力的寫作風格,露芙令我想起偉大的美國作家佛蘭納里奧康納,他被托馬斯默頓媲美為索福克勒斯。

好吧,我的確是有些偏心的。我認識了露芙已有十年,我與邁克及柏嘉祿家庭相當熟稔。 露芙,邁克和我都是主業會和維護生命運動的活躍份子,我們都擁有哈佛大學的學位。 有時想起露芙或是邁克都是同樣地好笑的,他們尚未畢業便結了婚,不再是未婚人仕 (bachelor)。那 ,在他們畢業時又怎能接受甚 學士學位 (bachelor) 呢!接着, 露芙 在麻省的 Citizens for Life那裏受聘為會長,服務了好幾年; 好像母親及家庭 主婦的工作 尚未能滿足於她。

以下是露芙在一個講座中談及的「生活計劃」,她說: "在你日常生活中的一套計劃或一個規則用來去實踐祈禱和其他方面的靈修生活"。 "這愛是天主真正期待的,這愛是真摯和值得的,這愛是在無數的清早起來,充滿歡樂,聆聽放學回家如雷動象群般的孩子們;帶着笑容迎接進入家門的丈夫和抑制着自己那急不及待想訴説緊張刺激一天的衝動。愛就是在這些無窮無盡,重複又重複的棄絕自我內加深和增長。

在1993年9月18日給朋友的信中,她寫道:「我完全明白妳在一天結束前那如釋重負的感受。母親們的渴望-每天如是,大約從下午4時開始,我和朋友潔蒂稱它是砒霜時段(或是妳或是她們,但亦有人能在茶點中度過!)。」

"無論怎樣,我們都掙扎熬過,熬過晚餐,熬過睡覺前的喧囂擾攘,在寫一封信 (好像這封) 或閱讀一至兩章書後便垮倒下來結束了這一天。 但這是了不起的生活。 依我看來,每一個人都會發現每天大部份時間是令人疲勞厭倦的苦事。不會因為妳是上班一族這些疲勞厭倦就會變得輕鬆一點。

其實在我來說,上班反而令我感到受到制於。很多人認為他們所賺到的金錢是能夠足以補償這些無盡繁重乏味的工作。我想我不會。

"家庭主婦有很多需要體能勞動和無盡繁重乏味的工作, 還要操心孩子們的 紛爭, 和吵鬧等等。但我們比大部份人有較多的自由空間去思索和與朋友閑 談。我無法想像會有一份差事比這更能令我稱心滿意。

教宗在這星期較早前説的一番話能清楚解釋露芙的看法:「實踐愛德是基督徒聖德唯一的途徑。」無論如何,愛德是要「如良好的種子,在靈魂內生長和孕育成果實。信徒一定要欣然聽命於天主的聖言和藉着它的恩寵,透過他們的工作實踐祂的旨意,時常參予聖事,特別是聖體和禮儀;他們要恆常祈禱,自我犧牲,熱心服務弟兄和鍛鍊德行。」(教宗本篤十六世 2011年4月13日通論)

買這本書,細嚼它,它正合時宜:荷李活下月將會推出一部電影名為 「潛在的巨龍」 描繪主業會的創立和創辦人聖施禮華的早期生活。露芙的故事有類似的聖德,出眾的德行,在現代美國芸芸眾生中生活,她的故事,雖說是發生在此時此處,卻是永遠長存和璀璨的。待續……..

過去我曾多次寫信來這網站尋求聖施禮華的 緊急代禱。這一次我是寫信來表示感謝。

2006年的時候我被診斷出患有結腸癌,只剩下幾個月的生命。那時我遇到一位來自主業會的朋友,他送給我一張印有聖施禮華肖像的祈禱卡。我用此去祈禱了兩年,而直到今天我仍活著,儘管我比較虛弱。PET-CT掃描顯示出我的腫瘤有正面的改變。

聖施禮華的祈禱卡幫助我繼續計劃我的人生,即使遇到我人生中悲痛的時候仍不會放棄自己。失眠的晚上是我祈禱的好時機。後來聖施禮華幫助我減少使用並直至停用嗎啡。讓我醫生很驚訝的是我只在短短兩日後就能停止使用它。通過我最敬愛的聖人,我開始在沒有安眠藥的幫助下能正常入睡。而且我只需在黃昏而不用在早上服用血壓藥。四十年來我飽受慢性失眠之苦而無藥可治,現在已兩年不用服食苯二氮安眠藥了。 我得承認這個經驗提醒我不要放棄我的每日默禱,而且盡可能在聖體櫃前作默想。

幾天前我祈求大家替一名未出生的嬰兒祈禱,他的父母得知他可能患有唐氏綜合症。他是我兒子的第四個小孩。他已結婚五年。好像所有的災難都發生在我們身上,因為沒多久前我們失去了我們二十四歲的智障女兒。三天前我 聽聞最後一次檢查已確認那嬰兒絕對沒有患唐氏綜合症。

最後,我希望請求我們最敬愛的轉禱者,聖施禮華,幫助我減去我因以上發生的事件而增加的10公斤體重。謝謝。

一星期內兩個奇蹟

中國,澳門 2011年9月3日

我是一個剛剛畢業正在找工作的畢業生。此過程其實讓我很沮喪,因為我的

身體情況為我找工作增添難度。幾次被拒絕的經驗令我失去希望,亦令我嫉妒其它人的正常生活。不過,因為我女朋友的鼓勵,我開始尋求聖施禮華的轉濤,助我找到工作。我持續向聖施禮華祈禱,希望他代我轉禱,助我找到一份合適的工作,好能為家庭的經濟作出貢獻。

兩天後我收到一間銀行的聘請,並要求我作入職前身體檢查。那時我意識到向聖施禮華祈求工作的九天祈禱卡的力量。我每天早餐前都會先作祈禱。幾天後銀行人力資源部通知我因為我的身體檢查結果,需要對我的情況再作跟進。那時我很沮喪,但我相信聖施華禮及我的女朋友。因此我繼續向聖施禮華祈禱。最後在上個星期,有兩個奇蹟發生。醫生告訴我我體內開始產生抗體,而我的身體情況亦開始改善。而且,我還收到銀行的聘請通知。這是我一生中一些極為震撼的時刻!

Classmate Remembers John Paul II

Young Wojtyła Was Already a Man of Prayer

ROME, MAY 8, 2011 (Zenit.org) - "It was August of 1944. When the uprising in Warsaw against the Nazis began, Cardinal Sapieha decided to gather the students in the archbishop's residence. That was the first time that I met Karol Wojtyła."

Monsignor Kazimierz Suder reads the memories recorded in tiny script on the white pages before him with a calm voice. On the other side of the table, like students awaiting an exam, were the journalists who had come to Krakow to meet the sole surviving member of the group of eight



young men who made up the clandestine seminary organized during the German occupation of Poland by the indomitable archbishop of Krakow, Adamo Sapieha, the city's last prince-archbishop.

"During the Nazi occupation," Monsignor Suder explained, "when a man expressed to the cardinal an intention to become a priest, the cardinal told him what to study at home in secret. None of us knew the others."

This was a necessary measure after the Nazis found five young men staying in the seminary that they had closed; they arrested and shot them, while others were deported to Auschwitz. After this Cardinal Sapieha took the seminary underground.

Listening

On the wall behind the elderly priest hung a portrait of Karol Wojtyła in a thoughtful mood, with his chin resting on his hand. From the windows of the room there is a view of the Mariacka Basilica where 50 years ago he carried out his work as a spiritual director.

"The image of Karol on that August day is still much impressed on my memory," Monsignor Suder said. "He had a white shirt and pants made of thick material with wooden clogs on his feet. A scar was evident on his forehead. Afterward, I found out

that he had been hit by a truck."

"He was a good companion," he recalled. "He didn't have problems with communication." Wojtyła was "modest in speaking insofar as he preferred to listen; he gave his opinion on issues but he didn't impose it, he tried to understand the other person; he never lied."

The young Wojtyła lent out his notes -- each page of his notebooks marked with the initials of Jesus and Mary -- and he gladly helped friends with their studies, but not with exams. In response to one companion who asked for the answers during a test he said: "Focus for a moment, ask the Holy Spirit and then try to give the answers yourself."

"He had a serene gaze," Monsignor Suder continued, "and a sense of humor; he liked listening to jokes."

"After the failure of the Warsaw uprising, the priests who had to flee the city came to the archbishop's residence and we gave them our rooms and all slept together in the cardinal's audience room, where we also had classes."

This period of very close common life that continued until the Russians arrived in 1945 brought many of the young men close together. "I knew that he was born in Wadovice, that he had come to Krakow with his father after all of his family died and that after his father, too, died in 1941, he decided that the purpose of his life was the priesthood."

Suffering

Another characteristic of the young Wojtyła that remained alive in the memory of his classmate was "sensitivity to human suffering. He gave the poor everything he received but with great discretion so as not to make a show of his generosity."

"Above all," Suder added, "he had the gift of knowing how to pray." He almost always prayed on his knees with the rosary in his hands and the Carmelite scapular about his neck. "He didn't separate the study of theology from prayer; for him it was all one. After night prayer he would remain in the chapel with the theology manual or the notebook. Connecting study with prayer and vice versa was one of his characteristics."

The monsignor also spoke of how the young men would see Cardinal Sapieha -- a proud opponent of the Nazis and support of the Polish resistance -- prone on the floor in prayer with his arms extended in the form of a cross.

On to Rome

Wojtyła was ordained a priest on Nov. 1, 1946. On the following day he celebrated his first Mass in the Chapel of St. Leonard in the Wawel Cathedral and on Nov. 10 in the parish of Wadowice.

"In the same week," Monsignor Suder noted, "Karol left for Rome for the doctorate, after only two years of study in the seminary."

The great adventure that would contribute to changing the history of his country and the world had begun.



Nurse Remembers John Paul II's Last Day

Says He Took on the Cross of Everyone Who Suffers

ROME, MAY 1, 2011 (Zenit.org) - "They called me in the late morning. I hurried because I was afraid that I would not arrive in time. Instead he was waiting for me. 'Good morning, Holiness, it's sunny today,' I said to him immediately because it was what he liked to hear when he was in the hospital."

This is how Rita Megliorin, former head nurse of the recovery ward at Rome's Gemelli Polyclinic, remembers the morning of April 2 when she was called to the papal apartment, to the sickbed of John Paul II, as he was dying.

Megliorin made her remarks Friday to reporters at Rome's University of the Holy Cross.

"I didn't think that he would recognize me. He looked at me. It wasn't that inquiring look that he used to have when he wanted to know immediately how his health was. It was a sweet gaze, which touched me," she recounted. "I felt the need to put my head on his hand, I allowed myself the luxury of receiving his last caress, laying his powerless hand on my face while he fixed his eyes upon the picture of the suffering Christ that hung on the wall in front of his bed."

Hearing the increasing volume of the singing, prayers, and acclamations of the young people in St. Peter's Square the nurse asked the Pope's secretary, Cardinal Stanislaw Dziwisz, if the noise didn't bother the Pope. "But he, taking me to the window, said: 'Rita, those are the children who have come to greet the father."

Light

Megliorin first met the Pope at Gemelli in January 2005. Coming to work one day, and not thinking about the Pope being there, she said that she was told to make haste to the 10th floor because there was "an important patient."

"Think," she said, "of a place where there is no space and where there is no time, and think only of a lot of light." This is what it was like being with John Paul II.

"During those months, every morning I came into the room to find him already awake because he had already been praying since 3. I would open the blinds and say 'Good morning, Holiness, it's sunny today.' He would turn to me and bless me. I would kneel and he would touch my face." This was the ritual that started the Holy Father's days. "Beyond that I was an inflexible nurse and he was an inflexible patient. He wanted to be updated on everything, the sickness, its gravity. If he didn't understand, he would give me a look that suggested a request for a better explanation."

"He never ceased to study man's problems. I remember the books on genetics, for example, that he consulted and studied attentively, even in the condition that he was in." "Every day," she explained, "he told us [that] 'every problem has a solution."

"And like every father he had a love for the weakest. For example, at WYD in Rome at Tor Vergata, he greeted the kids who were in the back, thinking that they weren't able to see much. In the hospital, too, he occupied himself with unimportant people and not with the great professors, he asked about their families, if they had children at home."

"The Pope endured what were perhaps the most difficult moments at the Polyclinic," she observed, but added that "helping the sick is a gift, at least for those who believe in God. But it is a singular experience for non-believers too."

Better today

Asked whether any particular film about the life of Wojtyla corresponded to what really went on in his dying moments, she responded with the question of whether anyone in the room had held a dying parent in their arms. "I can't answer," she said reluctantly. "Whoever hasn't experienced it can't understand."

Another reporter asked whether death was a relief. "Death is never a relief," she replied. "As a nurse, I can only say that there is a limit to care beyond which it becomes heroic."

John Paul II, "in the last moment of his life," Megliorin concluded, "took up his cross, taking on not just his own [cross] but that of all those who suffer. He did it with the joy that is born of the hope of believing in a better tomorrow. In fact, I think that for him it was already the hope in a better today."



That is why we try to provide these books through Spring Publications.

Some customers ask us questions about Opus Dei and our founder. A few ask about the dates of retreats and about the doctrine classes. I am more

than happy to respond to all these questions.

I also see the enthusiasm of those who volunteer to help us in the sales booth. The volunteers are faithful of the Prelature of Opus Dei, or cooperators or other friends. I can see that they are eager to help, and they often offer to speak to priests of other parishes in order for us to hold book sales there.

Through this initiative, people have been brought closer together. One customer told us that she posted on her Facebook account the books that she



bought and a few friends ordered some of them through her. We are thrilled to hear about such requests, knowing that the sale does not end there, but continues as more people read the books through their friends.

I guess it is like what St. Josemaría said in *The Way* (point no. 831): we are like the stone that falls into the lake and that "produces a first ripple ... and then another and another ... each time wider."

praying. In other words, the road we travel becomes clearer.



A Joyful Warrior for Life

Ruth Pakaluk, a mother of six, pro-life leader and Catholic convert, died from breast cancer at the age of 41. A recently published book gives a glimpse into her short but fruitful life.

Ruth, a supernumerary member of Opus Dei, died from breast cancer at the age of 41. "The Appalling Strangeness of the Mercy of God," published by Ignatius Press and edited by her husband Michael, is a collection of Ruth's letters that show her intelligence, deep faith and joyful spirit. The book concludes with several talks she gave for cooperators of Opus Dei.

The book has an introduction by philosopher Peter Kreef. He writes, "In this book you will meet a truly wonderful person. There are few things in life more precious than that. I invite you to meet a warrior for life whose pen is mightier than death's sword."

Author Michael Novak also praised the book highly: "I have never read a more beautiful and touching book -- a book about a joyous life and overpowering death, and grief and joy."

Ruth Pakaluk died of metastatic breast cancer in 1998 at the youthful age of 41. She had seven children (one of whom died of sudden infant death syndrome), and was married to Michael Pakaluk, professor of philosophy at Ave Maria University (and columnist for The Boston Pilot). Ignatius Press has just published a magnificent volume of her letters and talks entitled "The Appalling Strangeness of the Mercy of God," edited with a biographical overview and notes by Michael.

One might think that her life, marked by the untimely deaths of her son Thomas, followed by her own, was tragic. Actually, it is more a divine comedy that has a happy ending, manifesting "the appalling strangeness of the mercy of God," one of her favorite lines from a Graham Greene novel.

This is because, as Michael documents in his introduction, Ruth's life was one of continual conversion and joy amidst the ups and downs of daily life. She showed "the greatest love in the smallest things," as Pope Benedict recently said of St. Therese of the Child Jesus. Gifted with a great sense of humor, a powerful and penetrating intellect, and a dynamite writing style, Ruth reminds me of Flannery O'Connor, the great American writer whom Thomas Merton compared to Sophocles.

Okay, I'm biased. I knew Ruth the last ten years of her life, and have always been close to Michael and the Pakaluks. Ruth, Michael and I were all active in Opus Dei as well as the pro-life movement, and we all had Harvard bachelor's degrees. Funny to think of Ruth (or Michael, for that matter) as a bachelor of anything, since they got married as undergrads. Ruth went on to serve as president of Massachusetts Citizens for Life for a number of years, as if being a mother and homemaker didn't give her enough to do.

Here's Ruth giving a talk on Plan of Life, "a schedule or a system for working prayer and other aspects of the spiritual life into your daily routine": "The love God is really looking for, the love that is true and that counts, is the love of ten thousand mornings of getting up, being cheerful, listening to the kids when they come in from school like

a thundering herd of elephants, and smiling at your husband when he comes in from work and refraining from rehearsing all the horrors of your day. It is these countless, repeated acts of self-denial that makes love deepen and grow."

In a letter to a friend dated Sept. 18, 1993, she wrote: "I understand completely the relief you felt at the end of the day. Mothers long for the same every day starting at about 4:00 p.m. My friend Katy and I call it the Arsenic Hour (it's either you or them, but someone's going to get it in the tea).

"However, we somehow drag ourselves through it, through dinner, through the bedtime bedlam, then collapse at the close of the day after maybe writing a letter (like this one) or reading a chapter or two. But it is a great life. As far as I can make out, everyone has the burden of finding a large part of the day a grind. Just because you experience this in a business suit does not make it more pleasant. In fact, it seems to me to make it less pleasant, because business suits are uncomfortable. A surprising number of people find the money they make adequate compensation for this experience of drudgery. I don't think I would.

"Housewives have lots of physical work and drudgery and the psychologically difficult task of listening to children fight, cry, and whine. But we have more free time to think our own thoughts and converse with our friends than most people ever do. I cannot picture a job that would be more appealing to me than this."

The pope could easily have been explaining Ruth when he said earlier this week: "Christian holiness is none other than charity, fully experienced." However, in order that charity might, "like a good seed, grow in the soul and there bear fruit, the faithful must listen gladly to the Word of God and, by its grace, carry out His will through their works, participate frequently in the sacraments, above all the Eucharist and the Holy Liturgy; they must constantly apply themselves in prayer, in the abnegation of their selves, in the active service of their brothers and in the exercise of every virtue" (Pope Benedict XVI, general audience of April 13, 2011).

Get this book. Read this book. It couldn't be more timely: A Hollywood movie out next month entitled "There Be Dragons" depicts the origins of Opus Dei in the early years of St. Josemaria Escriva, its founder. Ruth's story is likewise one of holiness, extraordinary virtue, lived amidst ordinary concerns in modern America. Her story, though practically here and now, is nonetheless timeless and radiant. Sleeping normally again


G. V., Italy September 8, 2011
